Timeline of Tragedy

1830	President Andrew Jackson signs Indian Removal Act initiating resettlement of Native Americans
1838	One infamous march, the "Trail of Tears" resettlement of Cherokee Nation, credited with 8,000 deaths
1850+	-U.S. realizing the prize of the West eventually sparking Great Plains wars of the 1860s-1880s
1868	Treaty of Fort Laramie (2 nd version of this treaty) officially forced Indians to cede large tracts of their lands to the U.S. and assigned all Native Americans to reservations. Thus, ending nomadic hunting ways of survival
1887	General Allotment Act passed by Congress giving 160 acres of land per couple & 80 per single adult
1893	Famous Western Land Run net loss +80 million acres out of 138 million
1924	Citizenship Act made all American Indians citizens of the U.S.
1943	Official U.S. survey finds horrific conditions and severe poverty
1953	Tribe eradication era brings forced assimilation and loss of 109 tribes & 2.5 million prime acres by 1964
1978	Indian Religious Freedom Act passed to protect/preserve inherent right of freedom to believe, express, and exercise traditional religions of the American Indian
1993	Act added provision for enforcement of 1978 Act and ability to retain sacred sites
1994	Act extended 1978 Act making it legal to transport and use peyote for ceremonial purposes

Timeline of Tragedy

Living conditions on the reservations have been cited as "Comparable to Third World."

Casinos do benefit select tribes

Geographic proximity to a customer base = big dollars Only approximately 30 out 650 tribes have that luxury

Non-casino tribes challenged for sustainability

Bad lands = sparse natural resources and limited herds (roaming or raised) Poverty is crippling impacting education and innovation

Growing up, our founder saw the plight of children in Native America today.

Throughout her life's travels, she has seen first-hand how serious the living conditions and loss of hope & spirit exist on the reservations. She wanted to do something to make an impact, and feels we owe it to ALL Native Americans – The First People of America.

The Sheena V. Foundation (SVF), named in memory of her late niece – Sheena Vesta Osborne – who passed away from a very rare form of cancer at age 16. Parallel: Cancer ranks higher among Native American children than any other culture in our country. Thus, the inspiration for SVF and its alignment with Native America.

SVF is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) charitable foundation committed to restoring a self-sustaining environment through: Health & Wellness, Cancer Research for Children and Financial Literacy. All to preserve, protect and provide for the most valuable asset to any Native American Tribe/Nation – the children.

The foundation aims to create solutions to restore a sustainable environment that will support future generations. Our Focus: Educate Native youth on culturally appropriate long-term solutions to combat a quickly depleting environment.

Disproportionate Health Challenges

In addition to having higher rates of certain kinds of cancer, Native American children have a plethora of health challenges ahead of them driven by centuries of limited access to health care, healthy food and educational and employment opportunities.

Health Insights*

Over 50% of Indians on reservations rely on the Indian Health Service for medical care¹

Crisis-driven only based on funding

Wide gap in adequate and preventative health care

Pharmacies and doctors' offices outside of hospitals completely non-existent on some reservations

Pressure to shift from a traditional dietary ways of life to Western lifestyle dramatically changed the health of Native Americans

Epidemic of chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease, tuberculosis and cancer 20% more likely to have heart disease than other Americans and to die from it at a younger age ² 600% more likely to die from tuberculosis³

Disparities related to rates of cancer and cancer treatment higher than for any other Americans⁴

Suicide prevalent among Native American living on reservations

Suicide among youth now at crisis levels
Native American teens and young adults end their lives 3x often as their peers

Financial Insights*

Tribal and Federal governments the largest employers on the reservations

The scarcity of jobs and lack of economic opportunity

Depending on the reservation, 4 to 8 out of 10 adults on reservations unemployed¹
Many households overcrowded and earn only social security, disability, or veteran's income
Of all Indians, 28.2% live below federal poverty line²; 38% to 63% range for those living on reservations³

Often, heads of household forced to leave the reservation to seek work. Ramifications:

Grandparents take on the job of raising their grandchildren

Extended families pool meager resources to meet basic needs

Relative poverty still experienced by these blended families best described as the gap between the overall need and the need that goes unmet

Native American reservations resemble that of third world conditions⁴ or even fourth world

Term fourth world came into use in 1974

Refers to indigenous or cultural entities living in substandard conditions within or across a state's boundaries

Trail of Tears Indian Removal Remembrance (TTIRR)

It's a celebration of the history and culture of America's first people of the Five-Civilized Tribes and by no accident coincides with our country's 250th anniversary! It's a mobile education and immersion tour with routes across the country and Trail of Tears. Special focus is the Circle of Support lifting up the youth of the Native American community. TTIRR is slated to launch in June of 2026.

The torch will be an interactive and photogenic focal point for the event supported by a public relations effort that will bring out the media to cover the torch bearing as it passes through major media markets in North Carolina, Tennessee, Arkansas and Oklahoma.
